...Hands Up 4 Kids is a joy. No preparation needed – just a willingness to be there and engage a child with a book....

It was a photo of an adult and child reading together that attracted me to the article about Hands Up 4 Kids in the local paper. I have always loved books and especially loved choosing books for my pre-school children (now in

their forties). I still have a small collection I keep for my grandchildren's visits. "Where the Wild Things Are" by Maurice Sendak and Wilfrid Gordon MacDonald Partridge by Mem Fox are two of my favourites. Perhaps you have read them too? The sound of the words and the power of the story are spellbinding. This is an experience I want every child to have. Two grandchildren are two hours too far away.

When I was a student at Curtin University one of my favourite subjects was developmental psychology and for practical experience I volunteered as a literacy tutor at the High School in Fremantle. I was allotted a couple of reluctant readers and found it so rewarding when I discovered that reading parts in a play was something they would enter into with gusto.

During my career in environmental management I vowed that when I retired I would go back to this experience with kids that I got such a kick out of. I first volunteered in a school mentor program and spent individual time with a charming Grade 5 boy and a Grade 4 girl – who needed some extra attention. After a couple of years I found the preparation needed and the lack of practical support in the school a disincentive. Hands Up 4 Kids is a joy. No preparation needed – just a willingness to be there and engage a child with a book. And, such a wonderful variety of small human beings to take an interest in!

Lotterywest Organisational Development Grant

HU4K have been awarded a Lotterywest Organisational Grant. Funds from this grant enable HU4K to have significant design work undertaken - including logo, website and brochure design.

The logo has been used for a few months and is displayed on this newsletter heading.

The website and brochures are "works in progress", and are close to completion.

Included in the grant allocation is a training booklet for volunteers and a training manual for Zone Coordinators. A training CD is in the planning stage and we have taken possession of a quantity of very attractive desktop promotional signs which we will be asking local business to display on their counters. These signs are currently in place at the Australind Library and NAB's Victoria St branch.

HU4K now has teams of volunteers in 11 local schools, including Clifton Park Primary joining in this term.

The support from our volunteers and partner schools means that the work of helping our young children become better and more confident readers is continuing.

We continually endeavour to increase our volunteer numbers and have undertaken promotional events at local shopping centres. The information stand at Centre Point shopping centre for National Literacy and Numeracy Week (28-30 August 2014) resulted in 20 people registering an interest in becoming a HU4K volunteer. A similar event at the Australind Shopping Centre on (7 October 2014) resulted in 10 prospective volunteers.

Thank you to the volunteers who were able to help out and provide the public with first hand accounts of their volunteering experience.

Special thanks also to Jan P for her organisation of the Literacy week event, and to Nicole West and her students at Parkfield for the eye catching and very effective display board.

Bunbury Leschenault Rotary Club District Grant 2014

Once again, the Bunbury Leschenault Rotary Club (BLRC) has demonstrated its support of HU4K by not only submitting a grant application but securing the grant and also adding to the amount. A survey was undertaken earlier this year to gather information from school children regarding reading at home, and reading with HU4K volunteers. The 205 students, from 5 schools, who participated in the survey, came back with encouraging results, as may be seen in the following table.



Total of Yes answers

If your total of Yes answers is:

Eight or more - you are doing a great job. Keep up the good work.

Six-seven - you are better than average. Be mindful of your No answers and work toward being a Yes by practising good listening skills.

Five or less - some work could be done to improve your listening skills. Obtain relevant information from the library or internet regarding listening skills. Find a mentor who is a skilled listener. Practise with friends and family. Ask for constructive feedback.
